story that promotes diversity and equality.



Eco Schools

Have you ever noticed the Green Flag flying high above the school? This represents Everton Nursery Schools commitment to Environmental Education.

Eco-Schools is operated globally and was launched in 1994 in response to the 1992 UN Rio Earth Summit. Environmental charity Keep Britain Tidy is

the Eco-Schools National Operator for England, where more than 18,000 schools are registered and 1,200 schools currently hold the internationally recognised Eco-Schools Green Flag.

Here at Everton we currently hold The Eco Schools prestigious 'Ambassador' status. This award recognises the impact our Eco Curriculum has upon the education of young children. The award



acknowledges our commitment to providing essential learning experiences that shape children's values, perspectives and understanding of the world around them.

The programme we embed teaches children about ten topics; biodiversity, energy, litter, global citizenship, healthy living, school grounds, transport, waste, water and marine.

Walk to school week, Bird watching week, Red Nose Day, switch off fortnight, The Duckling project...these are just a few examples of how we support children to understand how they can help the environment. Our next project is 'Big School Clean' an opportunity to explore litter, waste and recycling.

If you have any cereal boxes, milk cartons, newspapers etc please contribute to the recycled materials station within each of the classes. Spend time showing your children how you recycle at home and how the bins are filled and collected.

As an Eco School we have Eco Committee which is formed by all staff and children. We come

together to discuss up and coming topics, review practice and share learning. If any parents/carers feel they could contribute towards the committee, please make a member of staff aware.

2019 has already been a very busy year for our Liverpool Philharmonic musicians as they are celebrating the 10th birthday of In Harmony Liverpool. 9th March 2019 marked the 10th birthday of the official programme launch. During the weekend of 9th, 10th and 11th March a series of celebrations were held at Liverpool Philharmonic hall. Staff, children and parents from Everton Nursery were invited along to join in with the celebrations across this weekend.

Thank you to many of our families who joined me in attending the 10th birthday celebration on Monday 11th March at Liverpool Philharmonic hall. This celebration included music from Everton Children's Orchestra,


Everton String Orchestra, Anfield Children's Choir

and members of the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra. In total, 250 young musicians performed their favourite pieces from In Harmony's 10 years during this celebration.

Since 2009, the programme has benefited over 2,000 children and families in Everton and Anfield and over 300 professional musicians, artists, school teachers and staff. Over 1500 children and young people aged 0-18 are learning music every week with In Harmony, free of charge. By the end of primary school, In Harmony young musicians have typically taken part in over 140 orchestra rehearsals and 25 performances. 50% of participating children continue to play

instruments at secondary school. 20 have gone on to perform in Liverpool Philharmonic Youth Orchestra, Liverpool Philharmonic Youth Academy Orchestra, National Children's Orchestra, National Youth Orchestra's *Inspire* Programme, and Sistema Europe Youth Orchestra. The children learn repertoire from across music genres including classical, pop, traditional and new music. Performance and musical excellence is at the heart of In Harmony.



Traditional Stories

This term we have been focusing on traditional stories with the children. Some particular favourites in Spencer 1 and 2 have been The Gingerbread Man and Goldilocks and the Three Bears. The children have enjoyed making their own gingerbread biscuits and gingerbread play dough and have learnt how to retell the story of the gingerbread man using actions and sign language.



Goldilocks and the Three Bears has also been popular with Cresswell class having a Goldilocks and the Three Bears malleable area and Spencer having a role play Three Bears cottage where



the children have explored size including small, medium and large and have enjoyed using the beds, bowls and chairs as props to re-enact the story.

The children have also participated in surveys and filled in tally charts for their favourite story. Groups of children have been around the nursery asking the staff and some parents what their favourite stories are, with The Gingerbread Man further proving to be a very popular favourite even amongst the adults.

The children were then given the opportunity to dress up as their favourite characters for world



book day and it was nice to see that many dressed up as traditional characters including Little Red Riding Hood and Goldilocks. Some parents also took the opportunity to come into the classroom throughout the week to read their own favourite stories to the children.

We would also like to take this opportunity to thank Cllr Gerard Woodhouse at the L6 Association for his kind donation of new books for the nursery including some traditional tales which have been added to our library and classrooms for the children to read.



Enriching Language

We have recently extended the Heyworth wing to include a language and literacy room and a sleep/small group room. The language and literacy room is a place that your child can use to play small group games and read books. We have raised money to buy books to improve children's language skills.

In order to gain good language children need specific basic skills

- Listening skills These are gained by listening to conversations and stories. We play listening games and learn to take turns and share.
- Concentration This is built up over time through play
- Understanding By asking children simple questions and giving them small tasks to do eg tidy up time, put an apron on.
- Speech By two your child should have a vocabulary of at least 50 words and putting two words together to form simple sentences.



We have a book of the week which is read at the end of every day.

The book is repeated so your child gets to know the story and pictures and begins to understand the meaning of the words.

Children are encouraged to join in with repeated refrains and actions e.g. I'll huff and I'll puff. They are also encouraged to listen as part of a group.

We also offer a library that your child can use weekly, giving you the opportunity to spend quality quiet time with your child on a daily basis.

This will encourage and enhance their language development. Kelly is also starting a home book scheme where a teddy and a book will be sent home with your child for the weekend.





Enriching Language

Books are displayed in every area of the room relating to specific areas or topics. These books offer a deeper understanding of what can be learnt in the area and children are encouraged to look at them with an adult or independently.

We have recently had world book day and some parents have been asked to come and read stories to the children at the end of the day, it was a great success. If any Heyworth parents are interested in doing this please speak to a member of the Heyworth team.





By reading to your child daily you will be teaching them new words, encouraging curiosity and the growth of their imagination. You will be opening up opportunities to extend their knowledge and understanding of the world they live in.

Books are an important tool that you can use with your child as part of their learning journey, not only stories but fiction books too.



Ducklings Lyndsey Gardner Higher Learning Teaching Assistant

The arrival of the duck eggs from Mount Bank Farm has recently had a key influence on children's learning across our Nursery school. Embryo eggs were provided, 2-3 days from hatching, giving children and adults the opportunity to observe this hatching process. This time enabled children to become engrossed in what could be inside the eggs. Dinosaurs and Unicorns to name just a few of the suggestions!




The incubator provided was calibrated to maintain a constant temperature of 37.5 Degrees Celsius. On day three the Ducklings began to hatch. Five healthy, hatched arrived and grew bigger day by day.



The ducklings required clean water and food each day to support their growth and development. Many children undertook the responsibility of this task each morning.

The children have developed their learning across all areas of the EYFS curriculum.



Counting Ducks and measuring sizes; Mathematics.

Developing care and empathy: Personal, Social and Emotional Development.

Singing Ducklings songs: Expressive Arts & Design.

The children observed the ducklings adapting to their environment effectively, both walking inside the brooder cage and swimming in water. The children of our Nursery school have been very fortunate to observe this living cycle, allowing them to develop their knowledge and understanding of the world around them accordingly. This project will then enable children to continue their understanding of growth, new life and the season of Spring.
